# Do you need co-pay assistance?

The Patient Access Network (PAN) Foundation offers free financial assistance for patients with **Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C** 

#### **About PAN**

The PAN Foundation is an independent, nationwide nonprofit dedicated to providing help and hope to people with chronic or life-threatening illnesses for whom cost limits access to breakthrough medical treatments. Since 2004, PAN has provided nearly \$400 million in assistance to more than 200,000 underinsured patients.

# **Who May Receive Assistance**

- Patient must be insured and insurance must cover the medication for which patient seeks assistance (Hepatitis B patients requesting assistance must have Medicare insurance)
- Patient must reside and receive treatment in the U.S
- Patient's household income must be at or below a certain percentage of the Federal Poverty Level, 400% for Hepatitis B and 500% for Hepatitis C (\$62,920 and \$78,650 respectively for a family of two)

# Frequently Asked Questions:

#### Is financial assistance from PAN free?

Yes, there is no charge to the patient or healthcare provider for patients to receive assistance from PAN.

# How long will it take to find out if I have qualified?

Applications are processed within ONE minute, giving patients *instant* access to financial assistance.

## Will I have to pay upfront and wait to be reimbursed?

No. PAN will pay your healthcare provider directly. If you have already incurred qualifying expenses, PAN is able to reimburse patients for expenses up to 90 days prior to PAN approval.

## How much money will I receive?

Patients with Hepatitis B will receive \$4,500 per year and patients with Hepatitis C will receive \$7,000 per year to assist with the out-of-pocket costs associated with their medications.

# Does PAN provide assistance for diseases other than Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C?

Yes, PAN provides assistance through more than 55 disease-specific programs designed to assist patients with various chronic illnesses, cancers, and rare diseases.
