


Arizona

In 2019:

Over 7 million People Lived in Arizona.

- From 2017-2018, Arizona ranked sixth in the nation for population growth with 1.6%
- The City of Phoenix increased its ranking to the fifth largest city in the United States with a population of 1.6 million

From 2013-2017, the number of HCV cases in Arizona increased 37.4%.

Access to Care

- Relatively high patient volume.
- Time to 1st
 appointment with HCV
 care provider varies
 greatly.
- Some payors have restrictions: Sobriety, provider, chronic.

Barriers

 Effective Treatment Exists, but Access to Treatment is Limited



Sobriety Restrictions

Periods of abstinence from substance or alcohol use prior to treatment.



Prescriber Restrictions

Designating which health care providers can prescribe treatment.
